Our Library: 41 Vibrant Community Hubs

In 2024, the Cincinnati & Hamilton County Public Library unveiled the re-envisioned Downtown Main Library, an exciting space for Minds of All Kinds. The electrifying reopening weekend reinforced what we do every day: welcome people to meet, read, work, learn, create, and connect at our 41 locations.

The Forest Park, Hyde Park, and Mt. Healthy branches also opened fresh public spaces as part of our Building the Next Generation Library initiative. We know these improvements are important to our community: overall, CHPL in-person visits are up 15% over 2023. And it is, of course, CHPL's dedicated staff, who ensure community members find books and materials, build their workforce, education, and technology skills, and can access support for their small businesses and entrepreneurial endeavors. Our staff members work every day to provide life-long learning opportunities to everyone for learning and enjoyment.

While the Library continues to evolve with the needs of our community, one thing will never change: our commitment to helping young Ohioans build early literacy skills. We host thousands of storytimes each year and deliver collections of books to dozens of schools and daycares, all designed to help kids discover a love for reading.

I want to thank our community members, staff, Trustees, partners, volunteers, and donors who support the Library's pursuit of gathering spaces for all to connect, relax, learn, and thrive. We greatly appreciate your support and hope you'll read further to discover all the ways we served and supported our community in 2024!

Nineteen of our 41 library branches (four of those in 2024) have now received improvements thanks to CHPL's Building the Next Generation Library initiative. We have a lot to celebrate thanks to taxpayers in Hamilton County. Local funding, such as the 10-year 1.5 mil levy passed by voters in 2023, is critical to continue providing excellent library spaces, services, and resources to all ages.

We carefully manage costs, operating dollars, and finances to ensure the high-quality experience community members expect. This stewardship includes monitoring spending on print and digital materials to address increased costs and reduce wait times and prioritizing staff training and market-aligned compensation to foster a workplace that best serves the community. In 2024, the Library was recognized for excellence in financial reporting by the Ohio Auditor of State's Award of Distinction and the Government Finance Officers Association's Certificate of Achievement.

Responding to a Greater Need for Government Resources

CHPL connects more than 1,000 people each month to **vital government resources** like free JFS faxing, public computers with WiFi, employment support, social security benefits, passport renewals, and much more. Because need is increasing in these areas, visits to library branches by Hamilton County's 513 Relief Bus are also a welcome sight.

Building Early Literacy Year-Round

Weekly library storytimes at CHPL's 41 locations are filled with giggling kids, great books, and energetic, knowledgeable Youth Librarians. Below the surface, they're an important way to practice counting, make new friends, and develop early literacy skills.

By including concepts from **Science of Reading**, CHPL storytimes also provide exposure to **social skills and literacy tools and concepts.** And, because the Science of Reading is part of Ohio's school curriculum, kids get a jumpstart for success in the classroom.

Improving Digital Materials Availability



Making Connections at Library Branches

Cincinnati & Hamilton County Public Library is committed to serving minds of all kinds during their **4 million visits to CHPL locations each year.** Hamilton County residents tell us that the Library is their community living room, a welcoming a place to connect with others, access resources, and have fun.

Visits to CHPL spaces opened in 2024 have grown 16.7% (compared with the prior year), no surprise given that Ohio is one of the top 3 states in the U.S. for public library visits.*

Creating Welcoming Spaces

Meet Me at Main

More than 12,000 people of all ages celebrated the **reopening of the Downtown Main Library**, a re-envisioned space for Hamilton County to connect with others, access resources, and have fun.

The redesigned meeting rooms, interactive areas for kids and teens, Catherine C. and Thomas E. Huenefeld Story Center, transformed North and South plazas, and the Social Stairs are part of the \$43.4 million project to serve changing community needs.

- Cincinnati Mayor Aftab Pureval, who proclaimed July 12 'Main Library Reopening Day' In year six of CHPL's Facility Master Plan implementation, we also invested in these inclusive and accessible spaces so the Library can truly be welcoming to all:



Hyde Park Branch Library saw increased accessibility through a refreshed interior: a larger elevator, redesigned entrances, a level parking lot, and fully accessible restrooms. The modern branch has more natural light, a meeting room, and even a puppet theater.

Forest Park Branch Library moved to a 26,440 square foot facility built from the ground up. The branch now includes a MakerSpace, meeting spaces and study rooms, an interactive play area for kids, an outdoor courtyard, a drive-thru, and ample parking.



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Mt. Healthy Branch Library moved to a former CVS pharmacy with 10,000 square feet of accessible space. The new branch has a flexible meeting room, study pods, exciting areas for kids and teens, computers and a laptop kiosk, a drive-thru, and a parking lot.
