Our Library: Where Our Community Connects

41 Locations for Lifelong Learning

In 2025, the Cincinnati & Hamilton County Public Library continued carrying out our mission by connecting people with the world of ideas and information. Whether you want to read, meet, work, learn, or create, the Library is the place where everyone belongs.

CHPL's 41 locations are often where children first discover the joy of reading — even before they start school. In 2025, 86 youth-focused staff were trained in techniques to help achieve the state's goal of building early literacy skills guided by the Science of Reading. Through our broad collection, engaging programs such as Storytimes and Summer Reading, and book deliveries to educators across the county, our staff and resources foster a lifelong love of reading.

The Cheviot and Oakley branches opened fresh public spaces as part of our Building the Next Generation Library initiative. Work also began at the Avondale, Oakley, Mariemont, Miami Township, Mt. Washington, and Symmes Township branches, and the Library acquired a site for the new College Hill Branch. These improvements are making an impact in the communities they serve: CHPL in-person visits are up 6% over 2024. And it is, of course, CHPL's dedicated staff who ensure community members find books and materials, build their workforce, education, and technology skills, and can access support for their small businesses and entrepreneurial endeavors. Our staff members work every day to provide life-long learning opportunities for everyone.

In October, Cincinnati hosted the sold-out Urban Libraries Council Leadership Forum for the first time, generating significant economic impact and elevating Cincinnati's profile as a hub for knowledge-sharing and civic engagement. It was an honor to show off what our staff, Trustees, partners, volunteers, and donors already know: our Library plays a crucial role in our community.

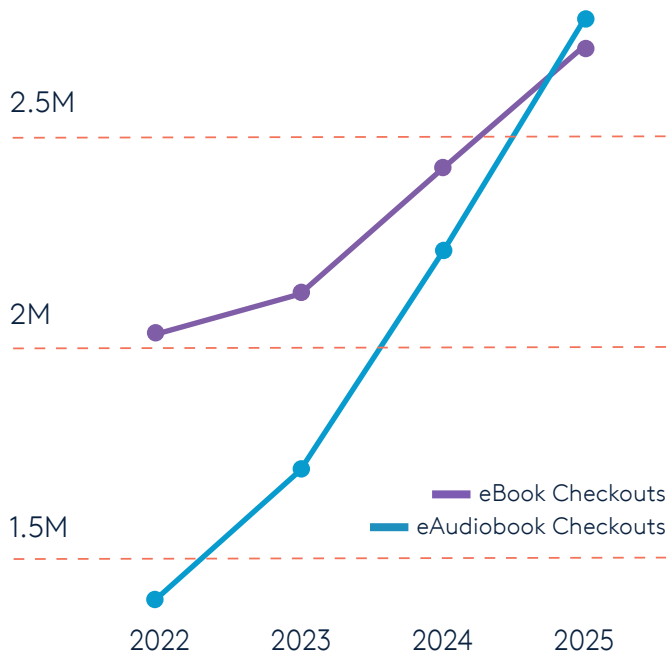

Building a Stronger Workforce in Hamilton County

Each month, CHPL supports hundreds of people in their pursuit of meaningful careers through **free job software, materials, and coaching**. The Library strengthens our county's workforce with free resume building, space for volunteer tutors and partners, adult new-reader materials, High School Equivalency study guides, digital literacy and weekly English literacy classes. Programs developed just for kids and teens help them prepare for in-demand careers.

The Library is committed to serving minds of all kinds through **MakerSpaces at six Library locations**. Customers create pretty much anything they can imagine with 3D printers, laser cutters, professional design software, and other tools – supported by CHPL's knowledgeable staff.

This **hands-on STEM equipment is available at no cost** other than the price of supplies, thanks to private funding from The Library Foundation.

MakerSpace equipment use increased by 17.6% compared to 2024, which is no surprise given its value in education and community-building!

I knew this was where my life was going to change. MakerSpace helped rebuild my confidence and create my business with cheaper materials. I eventually launched my company, Commercial Wraps, and it wouldn't exist today without the MakerSpace.

In year seven of CHPL's **Facility Master Plan** implementation, we also invested in these inclusive and accessible spaces so the Library can welcome all:



Cheviot Branch Library saw increased accessibility through a refreshed interior: an elevator with access to all levels, a newly accessible entry, and a meeting room on the main level. The mid-century modern branch has an expanded kids' area, an adult reading area, and upgraded shelving and furniture.

Oakley Branch Library reopened with an updated meeting room, expanded kids area, dedicated teen area, and new furniture throughout the branch. The building's end-of-life 35+ year old mechanical and electrical systems were also replaced.

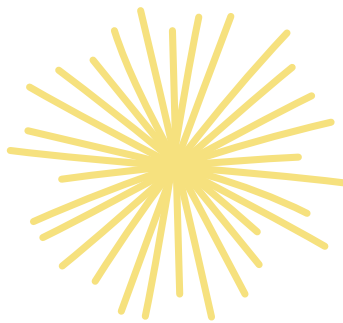

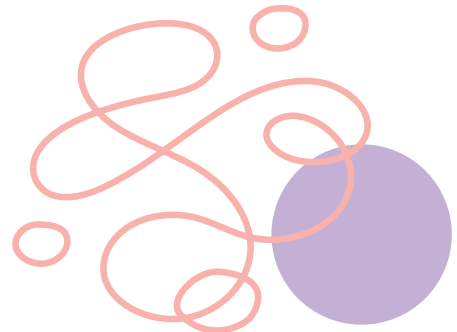
